Matthew DeMichele, a Senior Research Sociologist in the Center for Justice, Safety, and Resilience, has conducted criminal justice research for nearly 15 years focusing on correctional population trends, risk prediction, community corrections, and domestic extremism. He uses mixed methods approaches to investigate complex problems facing criminal justice systems within the United States and abroad. He is currently Principal Investigator for two Department of Justice (DOJ) funded studies and for a validation study of the Arnold Foundation's pretrial risk assessment instrument, and he is the Project Director for a MacArthur Foundation initiative evaluation.

Selected Project Experience

Evaluation of the Public Safety Assessment (2015 to date)—*Principal Investigator*. The Public Safety Assessment (PSA) was developed by the Laura and John Arnold Foundation to provide pretrial releasing authorities with a structured classification tool to inform pretrial release decisions. The PSA responds to a major need for a structured decision-making tool to assist in reducing jail populations and mitigating the collateral consequences of pretrial detainment such as loss of employment, separation from family, and disruption of adherence to medications. This project will provide a validation of the PSA through evaluations of the processes, outcomes, and related impacts of the PSA.

Annual Surveys of Probation and Parole (2015 to date)—*Principal Investigator*. This study consists of two separate data collections through which the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) obtains summary statistics (at the national and state level) on the number of adults under probation and parole supervision, the number of entries to and exits from supervision, and characteristics of the population supervised. The data are obtained from administrative sources of approximately 450 probation reporters (including some that report for multiple agencies) and 55 parole agencies via web surveys. Responsible for questionnaire development and all technical, budget, quality, and managerial aspects of the study.

Research and Evaluation on Domestic Radicalization to Violent Extremism: Supporting Exit USA (2015 to date)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this project is to conduct approximately 50 in-depth interviews with former right-wing extremists to understand the radicalization process and uncover exit patterns. The interview transcripts will be analyzed with a social networking approach to graph the language patterns of interviewees. This approach will provide a unique understanding of how individuals join extremist groups, the behaviors engaged in during membership, and the pathways out of such membership. The goal of the project is to provide a research foundation to support the development of materials used by a nongovernmental organization, Life After Hate, as it creates the Exit USA program.

Evaluation of the MacArthur Foundation Safety + Justice Challenge (2014 to date)—*Project Director*. The Safety + Justice Challenge (SJC) will support a network of competitively selected local jurisdictions committed to reducing over-reliance on jails in their communities. RTI is conducting a multifaceted evaluation at multiple levels of the initiative: (1) a process and outcome evaluation within intervention, learning network, and comparison sites; (2) a process evaluation of SJC partner support provided to sites; (3) process evaluations of communication and advocacy efforts by the Foundation and the partners to translate SJC accomplishments into national impacts; and (4) an impact evaluation of changes in the national jail population, disparities in that population, and public opinion around jails. Helps to create and implement the evaluation design and methodology, plans and interprets analyses, and interacts with staff from the Foundation and partners.

Evaluation of the HOPE Demonstration Field Experiment (2014 to date)—*Cost/Workload Task Lead*. Responsible for all aspects of this implementation, outcome, and cost-effectiveness study of the Honest Opportunity with Enforcement (HOPE) Demonstration Field Experiment. The goal of the field experiment, being conducted in four sites, is to provide a rigorous test of the deterrent effects of swift and certain sanctions in response to positive results on random drug test and other violations on targeted outcomes, including appointment compliance, drug tests, rearrest rates, revocation rates, jail days served, and prison days sentenced. This 54-month study is funded by NIJ.

Sentencing Risk Assessment Development: Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing (2012 to 2014)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this project was to provide initial data analysis of 5 years of sentencing data for high-risk offenders to inform risk assessment development to structure judicial decision making. The project used multiple quantitative analysis techniques, but recidivism analysis relied on survival analysis and count data models.

Institutional and Organization Framework to Understand the Implications of Probation Officer Tasks (2012 to 2013)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this project sponsored by the Indiana Judicial Center was to calculate workload requirements across 25 adult and juvenile probation departments. The project relied on semistructured telephone interviews with probation chiefs, officer surveys, and a time and motion study. Led all aspects of this project, developed all survey and interview instruments, performed the analysis, and presented the report to Indiana judicial officials.

Development of Risk Assessment Tools, Curriculum, and Training for DUI Community Supervision (2010)—*Principal Investigator*. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration funded this project to develop a risk assessment instrument for probation officers to use to predict DUI recidivism. The initial analysis relied on state-level data of nearly 3,800 probationers and parolees convicted of DUI. An instrument, the Impaired Driver Assessment, was developed and has been used in four states. Six-month recidivism data demonstrate that criminal history and emotional and mental health variables are predictive of failures during probation.

Workload Allocation for Public Safety: Phase II (2009)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this project for the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), U.S. Department of Justice, was to develop tools to assist community corrections agencies to conduct workload evaluations. This project relied on several focus groups and analysis of numerous workload evaluations conducted in multiple jurisdictions. The team identified five types of tasks that officers completed across 17 case types and provided time estimates for the tasks necessary to adequately supervise offenders.

Project Safe Neighborhoods, District-Level Outreach (fourth phase) (2008)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this BJA project was to inform probation and parole officers of the dangers of gang violence, provide training for effective gang offender supervision, and conduct national research on gang-related issues. The project resulted in numerous training sessions, several publications, and a Web site devoted to community corrections gang supervision.

Terrorism Awareness and Prevention: Training Community Corrections Officers and Prosecutors (2008)—*Principal Investigator*. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security, via a subaward through the National District Attorneys Association, sought to provide training and technical assistance to community corrections and judicial officials. The team led dozens of training sessions and developed an online training curriculum.

Workload Allocation for Community Corrections Officers: Phase I (2007)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this BJA project was to explore issues related to workload and caseload issues for community corrections organizations. The resulting white paper facilitated the development of Phase II of the project.

Supervising Lower-Risk Sex Offenders: An Integrated Perspective (2006)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this project for the National Institute of Corrections, Bureau of Prisons, was to train community corrections, law enforcement, and jail professionals about the multiple risk levels of sex offenders. The result of this project was a series of training sessions, several publications, and a CD-based training curriculum.

Sex Offender Community-Based Supervision: Case Management Strategies and Tools (2005)—*Principal Investigator*. The aim of this BJA project was to develop training on sex offender supervision for community corrections agencies and pilot test the training in multiple jurisdictions. This project resulted in a sex offender supervision training curriculum and several policy-related publications.
